19 Complainant alleges:

20 PARTIES

21 1. Leeza Rifredi ("Complainant") brings this Statement of Issues solely in her official
22 capacity as the Deputy Bureau Chief of the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education,
23 Department of Consumer Affairs.

24 2. On or about December 21, 2015, the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education
25 ("Bureau") received an Application for Renewal of Approval to Operate an Institution Non-
26 Accredited from Respondent Bay College of California ("Respondent"). The Bureau denied the
27 application on March 7, 2017.

JURISDICTION

1
2 3. This Statement of Issues is brought before the Director of the Department of
3 Consumer Affairs (“Director”) for the Bureau, under the authority of the following laws. All
4 section references are to the Education Code unless otherwise indicated.

5 4. **Section 94885, subdivision (a)** provides, in part:

6 “(a) The bureau shall adopt by regulation minimum operating standards for an institution
7 that shall reasonably ensure that all of the following occur:

8 “(1) The content of each educational program can achieve its stated objective.

9 ...

10 “(3) The facilities, instructional equipment, and materials are sufficient to enable students to
11 achieve the educational program's goals.

12 ...

13 “(7) That, upon satisfactory completion of an educational program, the institution gives
14 students a document signifying the degree or diploma awarded.

15 ...

16 “(9) The institution is maintained and operated in compliance with this chapter and all other
17 applicable ordinances and laws.”

18 5. **Section 94886** provides:

19 “Except as exempted in Article 4 (commencing with Section 94874) or in compliance with
20 the transition provisions in Article 2 (commencing with Section 94802), a person shall not open,
21 conduct, or do business as a private postsecondary educational institution in this state without
22 obtaining an approval to operate under this chapter.”

23 6. **Section 94887** provides:

24 “An approval to operate shall be granted only after an applicant has presented sufficient
25 evidence to the bureau, and the bureau has independently verified the information provided by the
26 applicant through site visits or other methods deemed appropriate by the bureau, that the applicant
27 has the capacity to satisfy the minimum operating standards. The bureau shall deny an application
28 for an approval to operate if the application does not satisfy those standards.”

STATUTORY AND REGULATORY PROVISIONS

7. **Section 94897** provides, in part:

“An institution shall not do any of the following:

...

“(i) Use a name in any manner improperly implying any of the following:

“(1) The institution is affiliated with any government agency, public or private corporation, agency, or association if it is not, in fact, thus affiliated.

...”

8. **Section 94900, subdivision (b)** provides:

“(b) An institution shall maintain, for each student granted a degree or certificate by that institution, permanent records of all of the following:

“(1) The degree or certificate granted and the date on which that degree or certificate was granted.

“(2) The courses and units on which the certificate or degree was based.

“(3) The grades earned by the student in each of those courses.”

9. **Section 94902** provides:

“(a) A student shall enroll solely by means of executing an enrollment agreement. The enrollment agreement shall be signed by the student and by an authorized employee of the institution.

“(b) An enrollment agreement is not enforceable unless all of the following requirements are met:

“(1) The student has received the institution's catalog and School Performance Fact Sheet prior to signing the enrollment agreement.

“(2) At the time of the execution of the enrollment agreement, the institution held a valid approval to operate.

“(3) Prior to the execution of the enrollment agreement, the student and the institution have signed and dated the information required to be disclosed in the Student Performance Fact Sheet pursuant to subdivisions (a) to (d), inclusive, of Section 94910. Each of these items in the Student

1 Performance Fact Sheet shall include a line for the student to initial and shall be initialed and
2 dated by the student.

3 “(c) A student shall receive a copy of the signed enrollment agreement, in writing or
4 electronically, regardless of whether total charges are paid by the student.”

5 10. **Section 94900.5** provides:

6 “An institution shall maintain, for a period of not less than five years, at its principal place
7 of business in this state, complete and accurate records of all of the following information:

8 “(a) The educational programs offered by the institution and the curriculum for each.

9 “(b) The names and addresses of the members of the institution's faculty and records of the
10 educational qualifications of each member of the faculty.

11 “(c) Any other records required to be maintained by this chapter, including, but not limited
12 to, records maintained pursuant to Article 16 (commencing with Section 94928).”

13 11. **Section 94909, subdivision (a)** provides, in part:

14 “(a) Except as provided in subdivision (d), prior to enrollment, an institution shall provide a
15 prospective student, either in writing or electronically, with a school catalog containing, at a
16 minimum, all of the following:

17 “(1) The name, address, telephone number, and, if applicable, Internet Web site address of
18 the institution.

19 . . .

20 “(5) A description of the programs offered and a description of the instruction provided in
21 each of the courses offered by the institution, the requirements for completion of each program,
22 including required courses, any final tests or examinations, any required internships or
23 externships, and the total number of credit hours, clock hours, or other increments required for
24 completion.

25 . . .

26 “(8) A detailed description of institutional policies in the following areas:

27 “(A) Admissions policies, including the institution's policies regarding the acceptance of
28 credits earned at other institutions or through challenge examinations and achievement tests,

1 admissions requirements for ability-to-benefit students, and a list describing any transfer or
2 articulation agreements between the institution and any other college or university that provides
3 for the transfer of credits earned in the program of instruction. If the institution has not entered
4 into an articulation or transfer agreement with any other college or university, the institution shall
5 disclose that fact.

6 ...

7 “(9) The schedule of total charges for a period of attendance and an estimated schedule of
8 total charges for the entire educational program.

9 ...”

10 12. **Section 94910** provides:

11 “Except as provided in subdivision (d) of Section 94909 and Section 94910.5, prior to
12 enrollment, an institution shall provide a prospective student with a School Performance Fact
13 Sheet containing, at a minimum, the following information, as it relates to the educational
14 program:

15 “(a) Completion rates, as calculated pursuant to Article 16 (commencing with Section
16 94928).

17 “(b) Placement rates for each educational program, as calculated pursuant to Article 16
18 (commencing with Section 94928), if the educational program is designed to lead to, or the
19 institution makes any express or implied claim related to preparing students for, a recognized
20 career, occupation, vocation, job, or job title.

21 “(c) License examination passage rates for programs leading to employment for which
22 passage of a state licensing examination is required, as calculated pursuant to Article 16
23 (commencing with Section 94928).

24 “(d) Salary or wage information, as calculated pursuant to Article 16 (commencing with
25 Section 94928).

26 “(e) If a program is too new to provide data for any of the categories listed in this
27 subdivision, the institution shall state on its fact sheet: “This program is new. Therefore, the
28 number of students who graduate, the number of students who are placed, or the starting salary

1 you can earn after finishing the educational program are unknown at this time. Information
2 regarding general salary and placement statistics may be available from government sources or
3 from the institution, but is not equivalent to actual performance data.”

4 “(f) All of the following:

5 “(1) A description of the manner in which the figures described in subdivisions (a) to (d),
6 inclusive, are calculated or a statement informing the reader of where he or she may obtain a
7 description of the manner in which the figures described in subdivisions (a) to (d), inclusive, are
8 calculated.

9 “(2) A statement informing the reader of where he or she may obtain from the institution a
10 list of the employment positions determined to be within the field for which a student received
11 education and training for the calculation of job placement rates as required by subdivision (b).

12 “(3) A statement informing the reader of where he or she may obtain from the institution a
13 list of the objective sources of information used to substantiate the salary disclosure as required
14 by subdivision (d).

15 “(g) The following statements:

16 “(1) ‘This fact sheet is filed with the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education.
17 Regardless of any information you may have relating to completion rates, placement rates,
18 starting salaries, or license exam passage rates, this fact sheet contains the information as
19 calculated pursuant to state law.’

20 “(2) ‘Any questions a student may have regarding this fact sheet that have not been
21 satisfactorily answered by the institution may be directed to the Bureau for Private Postsecondary
22 Education at (address), Sacramento, CA (ZIP Code), (Internet Web site address), (telephone and
23 fax numbers).’

24 “(h) If the institution participates in federal financial aid programs, the most recent three-
25 year cohort default rate reported by the United States Department of Education for the institution
26 and the percentage of enrolled students receiving federal student loans.

27 “(i) Data and information disclosed pursuant to subdivisions (a) to (d), inclusive, is not
28 required to include students who satisfy the qualifications specified in subdivision (d) of Section

1 94909, but an institution shall disclose whether the data, information, or both provided in its fact
2 sheet excludes students pursuant to this subdivision. An institution shall not actively use data
3 specific to the fact sheet in its recruitment materials or other recruitment efforts of students who
4 are not California residents and do not reside in California at the time of their enrollment.”

5 13. Section 94911 provides, in part:

6 “An enrollment agreement shall include, at a minimum, all of the following:

7 ...

8 “(b) A schedule of total charges, including a list of any charges that are nonrefundable and
9 the student's obligations to the Student Tuition Recovery Fund, clearly identified as
10 nonrefundable charges.

11 ...

12 “(d) A clear and conspicuous statement that the enrollment agreement is legally binding
13 when signed by the student and accepted by the institution.

14 “(e)(1) A disclosure with a clear and conspicuous caption, ‘STUDENT'S RIGHT TO
15 CANCEL,’ under which it is explained that the student has the right to cancel the enrollment
16 agreement and obtain a refund of charges paid through attendance at the first class session, or the
17 seventh day after enrollment, whichever is later.

18 “(2) The disclosure shall contain the institution's refund policy and a statement that, if the
19 student has received federal student financial aid funds, the student is entitled to a refund of
20 moneys not paid from federal student financial aid program funds.

21 ...”

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23 ////
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1 14. **Section 94930.5** provides, in part:

2 “Subject to Section 94930, an institution shall remit to the bureau for deposit in the Private
3 Postsecondary Education Administration Fund the following fees, in accordance with the
4 following schedule:

5 ...

6 “(c) The following fees shall apply to an institution seeking authorization of a substantive
7 change to its approval to operate, if applicable:

8 “(1) Processing fee for authorization of a substantive change to an approval to operate: five
9 hundred dollars (\$500).

10 “(2) Processing fee in connection with a substantive change to an approval to operate by
11 means of accreditation: two hundred fifty dollars (\$250).

12 ”

13 15. **Section 94932** provides:

14 “The bureau shall determine an institution's compliance with the requirements of this
15 chapter. The bureau shall have the power to require reports that institutions shall file with the
16 bureau in addition to the annual report, to send staff to an institution's sites, and to require
17 documents and responses from an institution to monitor compliance. When the bureau has reason
18 to believe that an institution may be out of compliance, it shall conduct an investigation of the
19 institution. If the bureau determines, after completing a compliance inspection or investigation,
20 that an institution has violated any applicable law or regulation, the bureau shall take appropriate
21 action pursuant to this article.”

22 16. **Section 94893** provides:

23 “If an institution intends to make a substantive change to its approval to operate, the
24 institution shall receive prior authorization from the bureau. Except as provided in subdivision
25 (a) of Section 94896, if the institution makes the substantive change without prior bureau
26 authorization, the institution's approval to operate may be suspended or revoked.”

27 ////

28 ////

1 17. **Section 94894, subdivision (e)** provides:

2 “The following changes to an approval to operate are considered substantive changes and
3 require prior authorization:

4 ...

5 “(e) A change of location.

6 ”

7 18. **California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71475** provides, in part:

8 ...

9 “(c) The application for renewal of approval to operate and offer educational programs for
10 non-accredited institutions shall include all of the following:

11 ...

12 “(4) The physical address, phone number and fax number of each campus and branch at
13 which the educational programs will be offered, including the identification of the institution's
14 main location and branch locations.

15 ...

16 “(h) The institution shall include in its application the name, title, physical address,
17 telephone number, fax number, and e-mail address for the agent for service of process in
18 California as required by section 94943.5 of the Code. The agent shall be at an address other than
19 the address of the institution or any branch. The agent must confirm the information and
20 acknowledge in writing that he or she is the designated agent for service of process. The
21 information shall be kept current pursuant to section 74190.

22 “(i) The institution shall include in its application an organization chart that shows the
23 governance and administrative structure of the institution and the relationship between faculty
24 and administrative positions. If there have been no substantive changes since the last submission
25 of an organizational chart, the institution may so state and is not required to submit
26 documentation.

27 ...

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1 “(k) The institution shall identify in the application the chief executive officer, chief
2 operating officer, and chief academic officer and describe their education, experience, and
3 qualifications to perform their duties and responsibilities. If there have been no substantive
4 changes since the last submission, the institution may so state and is not required to submit
5 documentation.

6 “(l) If the institution has a governing board, the application shall include the name, work
7 address, email address, and telephone number of each member of the governing board. If there
8 have been no substantive changes since the last submission, the institution may so state and is not
9 required to submit documentation.

10 ...

11 “(u) For each educational program that the institution offers or proposes to offer, the
12 application shall contain a statement that the educational program meets the requirements of
13 section 71710, as well as the following unless there have been no substantive changes since the
14 last submission. If there have been no substantive changes made the institution may so state and is
15 not required to provide documentation:

16 ...

17 “(7) Upon request, the institution shall provide to the Bureau copies of the curriculum or
18 syllabi required pursuant to section 71710.

19 ...

20 “(y)(1) For each program offered, the application shall contain a description of the facilities
21 and the equipment which is available for use by students at the main, branch, and satellite
22 locations of the institution unless there have been no substantive changes since the last
23 submission. If there have been no substantive changes made the institution may so state and is not
24 required to provide documentation.

25 “(2) For facilities that are leased or rented, the application shall contain the name and
26 address of the lessor or landlord, together with a copy of any use, lease, or rental agreements for
27 the facilities unless there have been no substantive changes since the last submission. If there
28

1 have been no substantive changes made the institution may so state and is not required to provide
2 documentation.

3 “(3) The application shall include, in addition to the description of the physical facilities,
4 building diagrams or campus maps to assist the Bureau in locating these facilities. The diagrams
5 or maps shall identify the location of classrooms, laboratories, workshops, and libraries unless
6 there have been no substantive changes since the last submission. If there have been no
7 substantive changes made the institution may so state and is not required to provide
8 documentation.

9 “(4) The description in the application shall include specifications of significant equipment
10 that demonstrate that the equipment meets the standards prescribed by the Code and this chapter
11 and is sufficient to enable students to achieve the educational objectives of each education
12 program unless there have been no substantive changes since the last submission. If there have
13 been no substantive changes made the institution may so state and is not required to provide
14 documentation.

15 “(5) For each item of significant equipment, the description in the application shall indicate
16 whether the equipment is owned, leased, rented, or licensed for short- or long-term, or owned by
17 another and loaned to be used without charge unless there have been no substantive changes since
18 the last submission. If there have been no substantive changes made the institution may so state
19 and is not required to provide documentation.

20 “(6) The application shall contain a list of all permits, certifications, or other evidence of
21 inspections or authorizations to operate required by the jurisdictions within which the institution
22 operates that the institution has obtained, and/or an explanation as to why those permits,
23 certifications, or inspections have not yet been obtained unless there have been no substantive
24 changes since the last submission. If there have been no substantive changes made the institution
25 may so state and is not required to provide documentation.

26 “(z) The application shall include a description of library holdings, services, and other
27 learning resources, including policies and procedures for supplying them to students who do not
28 receive classroom instruction. The description need not consist of a list of each holding. The

1 description shall include an explanation of how the library and other learning resources are
2 sufficient to support the instructional needs of students and, if no facilities exist at the institution,
3 how and when students may obtain access to a library and other learning resources as required by
4 the curriculum unless there have been no substantive changes since the last submission. If there
5 have been no substantive changes made the institution may so state and is not required to provide
6 documentation.

7 ...

8 “(bb) The application shall include a copy of the institution's catalog, in published or
9 proposed-to-be-published form. The catalog shall meet the requirements of the Act and of section
10 71810.

11 “(cc) The institution shall submit with the application, a copy of the document that is
12 awarded to a graduating student upon successful completion of each educational program unless
13 there have been no substantive changes since the last submission. If there have been no
14 substantive changes made the institution may so state and is not required to provide
15 documentation.

16 “(dd)(1) The application shall contain a description of how records required by Article 9 of
17 the Act or this chapter are or will be organized and maintained, the types of documents contained
18 in student files, how the records are stored, and whether academic and financial records are
19 maintained in separate files. The description shall include a statement of the institution's
20 procedures for security and safekeeping of records unless there have been no substantive changes
21 since the last submission. If there have been no substantive changes made the institution may so
22 state and is not required to provide documentation.

23 “(2) The description in the application shall include the name, physical address, email
24 address, and telephone number of the custodian of records, and the physical addresses and
25 telephone numbers of the offices or buildings where the records will be maintained unless there
26 have been no substantive changes since the last submission. If there have been no substantive
27 changes made the institution may so state and is not required to provide documentation.

28 ...

1 “(kk) An incomplete application filed under this section will render the institution ineligible
2 for renewal.”

3 **19. California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71500** provides:

4 “(a) An institution seeking a change of location as defined in 94823.5 of the Code shall
5 complete the “Change of Location” form (LOC rev. 2/10) to obtain prior authorization. The form
6 shall be submitted at least 60 days prior to the proposed date of the change in location unless an
7 unforeseen and unavoidable circumstance outside the control of the institution requires an earlier
8 change; in which case it shall be submitted no later than 30 days following the change in location.
9 The form shall be submitted to the Bureau along with the appropriate fee as provided in Section
10 94930.5(c) of the Code. It shall be signed by the signatory(ies) required by section 71380 and
11 dated, and each fact stated therein and each attachment thereto shall be declared to be true under
12 penalty of perjury, in the following form:

13 ‘I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the
14 foregoing and all attachments are true and correct.

15 _____

16 (Date)

15 _____

16 (Signature)’

17 “(b) The application shall establish that the institution can meet the minimum operating
18 standards contained in Chapter 3, and shall include:

19 “(1) The name, school code, current and proposed addresses, and telephone and fax
20 numbers of the institution;

21 “(2) A description of the proposed physical facilities, including building diagrams or
22 campus maps. The diagram or maps shall identify at a minimum, the locations of classrooms,
23 laboratories, workshops and libraries;

24 “(3) A description of any equipment to be used at the proposed facilities that is different
25 from the equipment used at the present facility;

26 “(4) The date on which the institution intends to offer instruction at the new location;

27 “(5) The distance between the approved location and the proposed new location;

28 “(6) The reason for the move;

1 “(7) A description of the actions taken to notify students, if any, pursuant to section
2 94898(d)(1) of the Code, and whether the institution has offered a full refund to students pursuant
3 to section 94898(d)(3) of the Code; and

4 “(8) The name, address, email address, telephone and fax numbers for the institution's
5 contact person for the purpose of this application.

6 “(c) The Bureau may deem the actions that the institution takes to notify students of the
7 proposed change of location to be sufficient notice for purposes of section 94898(d)(2).

8 “(d) An institution that has been granted an approval to operate by means of accreditation
9 shall notify the Bureau of the substantive change within 30 days of that change on the Change of
10 Location form, by providing the information required in sections (b)(1), (b)(8) of this section and
11 shall attach certification from the institution's accreditation agency demonstrating that the
12 substantive change was made in accordance with the institution's accreditation standards, and
13 complies with the Act and this Division.

14 “(1) The application for change of location for an institution approved by means of
15 accreditation shall be signed and dated by the signatory(ies) required by section 71390(d), and
16 each fact stated therein and each attachment thereto shall be declared to be true under penalty of
17 perjury, in the following form:

18 ““I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the
19 foregoing and all attachments are true and correct.

20 _____

21 (Date) (Signature)”

22 20. California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71700 provides:

23 “The Bureau may request that an institution document compliance with the standards set
24 forth in the Act and this Division to obtain and maintain an approval to operate.”

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1 21. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71710** provides, in part:

2 “In order to meet its mission and objectives, the educational program defined in section
3 94837 of the Code shall be comprised of a curriculum that includes:

4 “(a) those subject areas that are necessary for a student to achieve the educational objectives
5 of the educational program in which the student is enrolled;

6 “(b) subject areas and courses or modules that are presented in a logically organized manner
7 or sequence to students;

8 “(c) course or module materials that are designed or organized by duly qualified faculty.

9 For each course or module, each student shall be provided with a syllabus or course outline that
10 contains:

11 “(1) a short, descriptive title of the educational program;

12 “(2) a statement of educational objectives;

13 “(3) length of the educational program;

14 “(4) sequence and frequency of lessons or class sessions;

15 “(5) complete citations of textbooks and other required written materials;

16 “(6) sequential and detailed outline of subject matter to be addressed or a list of skills to be
17 learned and how those skills are to be measured;

18 “(7) instructional mode or methods.

19 “(d) if degree granting, require research of an appropriate degree that utilizes a library and
20 other learning resources;

21 “(e) specific learning outcomes tied to the sequence of the presentation of the material to
22 measure the students' learning of the material; and

23 “(f) evaluation by duly qualified faculty of those learning outcomes.”

24 22. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71715, subdivision (b)** provides:

25 “(b) The institution shall document that the instruction offered leads to the achievement of
26 the learning objectives of each course.”

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1 23. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71720, subdivision (a)** provides, in
2 part:

3 “(a) An Educational Program Leading to a Degree.

4 “(1) An institution offering an educational program that leads to a degree shall employ duly
5 qualified faculty sufficient in number to provide the instruction, student advisement, and learning
6 outcomes evaluation necessary for the institution to document its achievement of its stated
7 mission and objectives, and for students to achieve the specific learning objectives of each course
8 offered;

9 “(2) Each institution shall develop and implement written policies and procedures providing
10 for the participation by duly qualified faculty in the conducting of research, development of
11 curricula, academic planning, enforcement of standards of academic quality, pursuit of academic
12 matters related to the institution's mission and objectives, establishment of criteria for contracting
13 with new faculty, and evaluation of faculty credentials;

14 “...”

15 24. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71730** provides, in part:

16 “... ”

17 “(e) The chief academic officer shall possess a degree or equivalent acceptable experience
18 at least equal to the highest qualifications required of the institution's faculty. Chief academic
19 officers employed on the date of implementation of these regulations, who do not meet the
20 qualifications for their positions, shall have three years to earn the necessary degrees or
21 experience to qualify them for their position.

22 “(f) The institution shall employ administrative personnel who have the expertise to ensure
23 the achievement of the institution's mission and objectives and the operation of the educational
24 programs.

25 “...”

26 25. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71735** provides, in part:

27 “(a) An institution shall have sufficient facilities and necessary equipment to support the
28 achievement of the educational objectives of all of the courses and educational programs in which

1 students are enrolled. If an institution represents that the educational service will fit or prepare a
2 student for employment in a particular occupation or as described in particular job titles, either of
3 the following conditions shall be met:

4 “(1) The equipment used for instruction or provided to the student shall be comparable in
5 model type or features to equipment generally used in those occupations or job titles at the time
6 the instruction is offered.

7 “(2) The institution shall establish that the equipment used for instruction or provided to a
8 student is not obsolete and is sufficient for instructional purposes to reasonably assure that a
9 student acquires the necessary level of education, training, skill, and experience to obtain
10 employment in the field of training and to perform the tasks associated with the occupation or job
11 title to which the educational program was represented to lead.

12 “(b) An institution's facilities, including heating and cooling, ventilation, lighting,
13 classrooms, laboratories, and campus environs, shall be well-maintained. The institution shall
14 maintain all valid permits required by any public agencies relating to the health and safety of the
15 institution's facilities and equipment on file, and such permits shall be available to the Bureau
16 upon request.”

17 26. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71740, subdivision (d)** provides, in
18 part:

19 “(d) An institution that depends for library and other learning resources primarily on other
20 institutions' collections and resources not in its possession shall do all of the following:

21 . . .

22 “(2) Provide students and faculty with access to the regular services of a professional
23 librarian or information specialist experienced in the electronic retrieval of information, who shall
24 provide support for faculty in curriculum matters and actively serve as a resource guide for both
25 graduate and undergraduate students.

26 “(3) Assure that students have access to the library collections and resources of another
27 institution, organization, or library.

28 “(4) Document compliance with paragraphs (1), (2), and (3).”

1 27. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71770, subdivision (b)** provides:

2 “(b) The institution shall specify the maximum credit it will transfer from another
3 institution for each educational program, and the basis upon which the transferred credit will be
4 awarded.

5 “(1) Except as limited by subdivision (c) of this section, a maximum of 75 percent of the
6 units or credit that may be applied toward the award of a bachelor's degree may be derived from a
7 combination of any or both of the following:

8 “(A) Units earned at institutions approved by the Bureau, public or private institutions of
9 higher learning accredited by an accrediting association recognized by the U. S. Department of
10 Education, or any institution of higher learning, including foreign institutions, if the institution
11 offering the undergraduate program documents that the institution of higher learning at which the
12 units were earned offers degree programs equivalent to degree programs approved by the Bureau
13 or accredited by an accrediting association recognized by the U.S. Department of Education;

14 “(B) Challenge examinations and standardized tests such as the College Level Placement
15 Tests (CLEP) for specific academic disciplines.

16 “(2) No more than 20% of graduate semester units or the equivalent in other units awarded
17 by another institution may be transferred for credit toward a Master's degree. An institution may
18 accept transfer credits only from the institutions of higher learning described in subsection (1)(A).

19 “(3) No more than 30 graduate semester credits or its equivalent awarded by another
20 institution may be credited toward a doctoral degree. This subdivision does not apply to graduate
21 programs that lead to a profession or an occupation requiring state licensure where the licensing
22 agency has a regulation permitting a different standard.”

1 28. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71775.5** provides:

15 “• Stop all enrollment in its degree programs, and

16 “• Provide a teach-out to finish the educational program or provide a refund.

17 “An institution that fails to comply with accreditation requirements by the required dates
18 shall have its approval to offer degree programs automatically suspended.

21 “(b) The student and an institutional representative shall initial and date the notice prior to
22 executing an enrollment agreement. An initialed copy of the notice shall be given to the student
23 and the original shall be retained in the enrolled student's records.

24 “(c) The notice shall also be posted immediately preceding or following as to clearly pertain
25 to the description of the degree program, including, but not limited to, one or more of the
26 following; admissions requirements, length of program, courses offered or areas of focus. Such
27 notice shall be included, at a minimum, in the following locations:

28 “(1) The institution's catalog where each degree program is described.

1 “(2) The institution's website where each degree program is described.

2 “(3) The institution's degree program brochures.”

3 29. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71800** provides, in part:

4 “In addition to the requirements of section 94911 of the Code, an institution shall provide to
5 each student an enrollment agreement that contains at the least the following information:

6 “(a) The name and address of the institution and the addresses where instruction will be
7 provided.

8 ...

9 “(d) Date by which the student must exercise his or her right to cancel or withdraw, and the
10 refund policy, including any alternative method of calculation if approved by the Bureau pursuant
11 to section 94921 of the Code.

12 “(e) Itemization of all institutional charges and fees including, as applicable:

13 “(1) tuition;

14 “(2) registration fee (non-refundable);

15 “(3) equipment;

16 “(4) lab supplies or kits;

17 “(5) Textbooks, or other learning media;

18 “(6) uniforms or other special protective clothing;

19 “(7) in-resident housing;

20 “(8) tutoring;

21 “(9) assessment fees for transfer of credits;

22 “(10) fees to transfer credits;

23 “(11) Student Tuition Recovery Fund fee (non-refundable);

24 “(12) any other institutional charge or fee.

25 ”

26 30. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71810** provides, in part:

27 “(a) Each institution shall provide a catalog pursuant to section 94909 of the Code, which
28 shall be updated annually. Annual updates may be made by the use of supplements or inserts

1 accompanying the catalog. If changes in educational programs, educational services, procedures,
2 or policies required to be included in the catalog by statute or regulation are implemented before
3 the issuance of the annually updated catalog, those changes shall be reflected at the time they are
4 made in supplements or inserts accompanying the catalog.

5 “(b) The catalog shall contain the information prescribed by Section 94909 of the Code and
6 all of the following:

7 ...

8 “(3) If the institution admits students from other countries, whether visa services are
9 provided or whether the institution will vouch for student status, and any associated charges;

10 ...

11 “(10) A description of library and other learning resources and the procedures for student
12 access to those resources;

13 ...

14 “(15) Policies on the retention of student records.”

15 31. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 71930** provides, in part:

16 “(a) An institution shall maintain all records required by the Act and this chapter. The
17 records shall be maintained in this state.

18 “(b)(1) In addition to permanently retaining a transcript as required by section 94900(b) of
19 the Code, the institution shall maintain for a period of 5 years the pertinent student records
20 described in Section 71920 from the student's date of completion or withdrawal.

21 “(2) Notwithstanding (b)(1), the institution shall maintain records relating to federal
22 financial aid programs as provided by federal law.

23 ...”

24 32. **California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 74000** provides:

25 “(a) An institution shall pay the fees established by Article 17 of the Act. A failure to
26 include a fee with an application or other request renders the application or request incomplete.

27 “(b) All fees lawfully collected are non-refundable.

28

1 “(c) A fee that is not paid timely is subject to penalty as set forth in section 94931 of the
2 Code.

3 “(d) The Bureau shall deny a renewal of an approval to operate if the institution fails to
4 submit at the time it files its application for renewal of an approval to operate: all unpaid fees;
5 penalty fees; penalties; orders for reimbursement of costs and expenses; and assessments for, and
6 reimbursement of all payments made to students from, the Student Tuition Recovery Fund.

7 “(e)(1) If an institution fails to pay any fee and any penalty fees timely, the Bureau may
8 initiate proceedings to revoke the institution's approval to operate for failure to pay fees.

9 “(2) Any proceeding to revoke an institution's approval to operate is subject to the
10 provisions of Chapter 5 of the Administrative Procedures Act. If a hearing is requested, it shall be
11 limited to the issues of whether any fee or penalty was owed and, if so, whether the fee or penalty
12 were paid when originally due.

13 “(3) The procedure specified in this subdivision is cumulative to any other right or remedy
14 the Bureau may invoke against an institution which fails to pay its annual fee or a penalty fee
15 when originally due. Nothing in this subdivision restricts the Bureau's authority to bring other
16 administrative or judicial action against an institution that fails to pay its fees when due.

17 “(4) An institution whose approval to operate was revoked because of nonpayment of an
18 annual fee or penalty fee may seek to obtain approval to operate only by filing an application for
19 a new approval to operate.”

20 **33. California Code of Regulations, title, 5, section 74112 provides:**

6 “(d) In addition to the definitions contained in section 94928 of the Code:

7 “(1) ‘Number of Students Who Began the Program’ means the number of students who
8 began a program who were scheduled to complete the program within 100% of the published
9 program length within the reporting calendar year, and excludes all students who cancelled during
10 the cancellation period.

11 “(2) ‘Number of On-time Graduates’ means the number of students who completed the
12 program within 100% of the published program length within the reporting calendar year.

13 “(3) ‘Gainfully Employed’ means:

14 “(A)(i) The graduate is employed in a job classification under the United States Department
15 of Labor's Standard Occupational Classification codes, using the Detailed Occupation (six-digit)
16 level, for which the institution has identified in its catalog and in its employment positions list
17 required by section 94910(f)(2) of the Code that the program prepares its graduates; and

18 “(ii) The graduate is employed in a single position or concurrent aggregated positions
19 totaling at least 30 hours per week for 5 weeks (35 calendar days), or totaling at least 20 hours per
20 week for 5 weeks (35 calendar days) with a statement signed by the graduate stating that he or she
21 chose to seek part-time employment rather than fulltime employment after graduation; or

22 “(B) The graduate is employed by the same employer that employed the graduate before
23 enrollment, and any of the following conditions are met:

24 “(i) the graduate is employed in an occupation with a different Detailed Occupation (six-
25 digit) level Standard Occupational Classification code than applies to the position in which the
26 graduate was employed before enrollment; or

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1 “(ii) the employer or the graduate provides a statement to the effect that the employment
2 after graduation was the result of a promotion with increased pay, due at least in part to
3 graduation from the program; or

4 “(iii) the employer or the graduate provides a statement to the effect that the degree or the
5 completed program was required as a condition of continued employment; or

6 “(C) The graduate is self-employed or working freelance as reasonably evidenced by, but
7 not limited to, a business license, fictitious business name statement, advertising (other than
8 business cards), website, or business receipts or other evidence of income from business; or an
9 attestation signed by the graduate of self-employment or freelance work and dated after
10 graduation.

11 “(e) Reporting periods:

12 “(1) An Annual Report shall include data for all educational programs as defined in section
13 94837 of the Code for the previous one calendar year.

14 “(2) A Performance Fact Sheet shall be current and available not later than December 1st,
15 and shall report data for the previous two calendar years based upon the ‘number of students who
16 began the program,’ as defined in subdivision (d)(1) of this section and were scheduled to
17 graduate in the reported year(s).

18 “(f) Total Charges. The institution's Annual Report and Performance Fact Sheet shall
19 include the total charges for a student to complete the program within 100% of the program
20 length. The institution must include the disclosure that there may be additional charges if the
21 program is not completed on-time.

22 “Total charges shall be disclosed in the Performance Fact Sheet in a format substantially

10 “‘150% Completion Rate’ is the number of students who completed the program in the
11 reported calendar year within 150% of the published program length, including on-time
12 graduates, divided by the number of students available for graduation.

13 “‘Graduates Available for Employment’ means the number of graduates minus the number
14 of graduates unavailable for employment.

15 “‘Graduates Unavailable for Employment’ means the graduates who, after graduation, die,
16 become incarcerated, are called to active military duty, are international students that leave the
17 United States or do not have a visa allowing employment in the United States, or are continuing
18 their education in an accredited or bureau-approved postsecondary institution.

19 “‘Graduates Employed in the Field’ means graduates who beginning within six months
20 after a student completes the applicable educational program are gainfully employed, whose
21 employment has been reported, and for whom the institution has documented verification of
22 employment. For occupations for which the state requires passing an examination, the six month
23 period begins after the announcement of the examination results for the first examination
24 available after a student completes an applicable educational program.

25 “‘Placement Rate Employed in the Field’ is calculated by dividing the number of graduates
26 gainfully employed in the field by the number of graduates available for employment.

27 “‘Number of Graduates Taking Exam’ is the number of graduates who took the first
28 available exam in the reported calendar year.

1 “‘First Available Exam Date’ is the date for the first available exam after a student
2 completed a program.

3 “‘Passage Rate’ is calculated by dividing the number of graduates who passed the exam by
4 the number of graduates who took the reported licensing exam.

5 “‘Number Who Passed First Available Exam’ is the number of graduates who took and
6 passed the first available licensing exam after completing the program.

7 “‘Salary’ is as reported by graduate or graduate's employer.

8 “‘No Salary Information Reported’ is the number of graduates for whom, after making
9 reasonable attempts, the school was not able to obtain salary information.

10 “(m) Documentation supporting all data reported shall be maintained electronically by the
11 institution for at least five years from the last time the data was included in either an Annual
12 Report or a Performance Fact Sheet and shall be provided to the Bureau upon request; the data for
13 each program shall include at a minimum:

14 “(1) the list of job classifications determined to be considered gainful employment for the
15 educational program;

16 “(2) student name(s), address, phone number, email address, program completed, program
17 start date, scheduled completion date, and actual completion date;

18 “(3) graduate's place of employment and position, date employment began, date
19 employment ended, if applicable, actual salary, hours per week, and the date employment was
20 verified;

21 “(4) for each employer from which employment or salary information was obtained, the
22 employer name(s) address and general phone number, the contact person at the employer and the
23 contact's phone number and email address, and all written communication with employer
24 verifying student's employment or salary;

25 “(5) for students who become self-employed, all documentation necessary to demonstrate
26 self-employment;

27 “(6) a description of all attempts to contact each student or employer;

28

1 “(7) any and all documentation used to provide data regarding license examinations and
2 examination results;

3 “(8) for each student determined to be unavailable for graduation or unavailable for
4 employment, the identity of the student, the type of unavailability, the dates of unavailability, and
5 the documentation of the unavailability; and

6 “(9) the name, email address, phone number, and position or title of the institution's
7 representative who was primarily responsible for obtaining the students' completion, placement,
8 licensing, and salary and wage data, the date that the information was gathered, and copies of
9 notes, letters or emails through which the information was requested and gathered.

10 “(n) The institution shall provide on a separate document along with the Performance Fact
11 Sheet the same cancellation disclosure as that which is required to be included with the
12 enrollment agreement by Section 94911(e)(1) of the Code. The separate document shall be
13 substantially the same size as the Performance Fact Sheet and shall be captioned ‘STUDENT'S
14 RIGHT TO CANCEL’ using bold 14 pt. type.”

15 FIRST CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

16 (Incomplete Application – Campus Location)

17 (Educ. Code §§ 94887, 94893, and 94894, subd. (e); and Cal. Code Regs., title 5, §§ 71475,
 subds. (c)(4) and (kk), and 71500)

18 34. Respondent's application is subject to denial because it fails to reference a prior-
19 approved campus address. (Educ. Code § 94887, 94893, and 94894, subd. (e); and Cal. Code
20 Regs., title 5, §§ 71475, subds. (c)(4) and (kk), and 71500). In addition, any institution with an
21 approval to operate must obtain the Bureau's approval prior to changing its campus location.
22 (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71500). The main campus location stated in Respondent's
23 application was not approved by the Bureau. Although the Bureau has instructed Respondent to
24 submit a “Change of Location” form to obtain approval to use this campus location, Respondent
25 declined. The Bureau cannot approve Respondent's application because the application states a
26 main campus location that has not been approved in violation of Sections 94893 and 94894,
27 subdivision (e).

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1 SECOND CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION
2 (Incomplete Application – Agent for Service of Process)
3 (Educ. Code § 94887; Cal. Code Regs., title 5, §§ 71475, subds. (h) and (kk))

4 35. Respondent’s application is subject to denial because it fails to provide, for
5 Respondent’s agent for service of process, an email address and confirmation in writing that he or
6 she is the designated agent for service of process, as required by California Code of Regulations,
7 title 5, section 71475, subdivision (h). (Cal. Educ. Code § 94887; Cal. Code Regs., title 5, §§
8 71475, subds. (h) and (k)(k)).

9 THIRD CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION
10 (Incomplete Application – Details Regarding Governance and Administration)
11 (Educ. Code §§ 94887 and 94932; Cal. Code Regs., title 5, §§ 71475, subds. (i), (k), and (l),
12 71700, and 71730, subds. (e) and (f))

13 36. Respondent’s application is subject to denial because it fails to document that it has
14 the requisite governance and administration. (Educ. Code §§ 94887 and 94932; Cal. Code Regs.,
15 title 5, §§ 71475, subd. (k), 71700, and 71730, subds. (e) and (f)). In particular:

16 a. Respondent did not provide an organizational chart showing its institution’s
17 governance and administrative structure and the relationship between faculty and administrative
18 positions. While Respondent represented to the Bureau that there were no substantive changes to
19 report, pursuant to Education Code section 94932 and Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 71700
20 and 71730, subdivision (f), Respondent is required to provide, at the Bureau’s request,
21 documentation demonstrating its ability to obtain and maintain an approval to operate. In a letter
22 dated December 6, 2016, the Bureau instructed Respondent to provide an organizational chart
23 showing the governance and administrative structure of its institution and the relationship
24 between faculty and administrative positions. Respondent did not respond.

25 b. Respondent did not provide a description of the job duties and responsibilities
26 of each administrative and faculty position. While Respondent represented to the Bureau that
27 there were no substantive changes to report, pursuant to Education Code section 94932 and Code
28 of Regulations, title 5, section 71700, Respondent is required to provide, at the Bureau’s request,
documentation demonstrating its ability to obtain and maintain an approval to operate. In a letter
dated December 6, 2016, the Bureau instructed Respondent to provide a description of the job

1 duties and responsibilities of each administrative and faculty position. Respondent did not
2 respond.

3 c. Respondent did not identify its chief executive officer and chief operating
4 officer, and describe their education, experience, and qualifications to perform their duties and
5 responsibilities. While Respondent represented to the Bureau that there were no substantive
6 changes to report, pursuant to Education Code section 94932 and Code of Regulations, title 5,
7 section 71700, Respondent is required to provide, at the Bureau's request, documentation
8 demonstrating its ability to obtain and maintain an approval to operate. In a letter dated
9 December 6, 2016, the Bureau instructed Respondent to identify its chief executive officer and
10 chief operating officer, and describe their education, experience, and qualifications to perform
11 their duties and responsibilities. Respondent did not respond.

12 d. Respondent did not provide the academic qualifications of its chief academic
13 officer ("CAO") and describe the CAO's education, experience, and qualifications. While
14 Respondent represented to the Bureau that there were no substantive changes to report, pursuant
15 to Education Code section 94932 and Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 71700 and 71730,
16 subdivision (e), Respondent is required to provide, at the Bureau's request, documentation
17 demonstrating its ability to obtain and maintain an approval to operate. In a letter dated
18 December 6, 2016, the Bureau instructed Respondent to provide the academic qualifications of its
19 CAO and describe the CAO's education, experience, and qualifications. Respondent did not
20 respond.

21 e. Respondent did not provide the name, work address, email address, and
22 telephone number of each member of its governing board. While Respondent represented to the
23 Bureau that there were no substantive changes to report, pursuant to Education Code section
24 94932 and Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71700, Respondent is required to provide, at the
25 Bureau's request, documentation demonstrating its ability to obtain and maintain approval to
26 operate. In a letter dated December 6, 2016, the Bureau instructed Respondent to provide the
27 name, work address, email address, and telephone number of each member of its governing
28 board. Respondent did not respond.

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2 FOURTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Exemplars of Student Agreements)

3 (Educ. Code §§ 94885, subd. (a)(9), 94887, and 94911, subs. (b) and (e)(2); and
4 Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71800, subs. (a), (d), and (e))

5 37. Respondent's application is subject to denial because the enrollment agreement it
6 provided is not sufficient. (Educ. Code §§ 94885, subd. (a)(9), 94887, and 94911, subs. (b) and
7 (e)(2); and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71800, subs. (a), (d), and (e)). In particular:

8 a. Because the institution has not received authorization for the main campus
9 location stated on its enrollment agreement, that enrollment agreement is not valid.

10 b. The registration fee that is listed on page 1 of the enrollment agreement, under
11 "Institutional Charges" is \$50. This is inconsistent with the refund policy, at the bottom of the
12 same page, which states that the registration fee is \$150 non-refundable. In addition, a transcript
13 fee of \$15 is referenced on page 25 of the 2015-2016 catalog, but this fee is stated as \$10 on the
14 schedule of charges that is published on page 37 of the catalog.

15 FIFTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Advertising and Other Public Statements)

16 (Educ. Code § 94887 and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71775.5)

17 38. Respondent's application is subject to denial because its Notice to Prospective Degree
18 Program Students fails to disclose the dates by which the institution is required to achieve pre-
19 accreditation and full accreditation. (Educ. Code § 94887 and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §
20 71775.5).

21 SIXTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Instruction and Degrees Offered)

22 (Educ. Code §§ 94885, subd. (a)(1) and 94887; and
23 Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71715, subd. (b))

24 39. Respondent's application is subject to denial because it has failed to document that
25 the instruction offered leads to the achievement of the learning objectives of each course. (Educ.
26 Code §§ 94887 and 94885, subd. (a)(1); and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71715, subd. (b)). In
27 particular:

28 a. Respondent seeks to renew three Bachelor of Arts degree programs (in
"Computer Arts–New Media," "Digital Arts and Communications," and "Graphic Design") and
two Bachelor of Science degree programs (in "Business and Management" and "Economics and

1 Finance"). Respondent's catalog purports that each educational program offers different
2 educational objectives. But according to the catalog, Respondent has outlined identical education
3 course curricula for each of the Bachelor of Arts programs and the Bachelor of Science programs.

4 b. In a December 6, 2016 letter, the Bureau instructed Respondent to articulate the
5 educational objectives and learning outcomes for its educational programs. Respondent did not
6 respond.

7 c. Given that each educational program results in a separate undergraduate degree,
8 Respondent has not offered evidence that the contents of each of its educational programs can
9 achieve their stated objectives. Nor has Respondent documented that its instruction leads to the
10 achievement of the learning objectives of each course. In addition, Respondent has not
11 demonstrated that it has adequately planned an educational curriculum with the capacity to meet
12 minimum operating standards.

13 SEVENTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

14 (Description of Educational Programs)

15 (Educ. Code §§ 94885, subd. (a)(1) and 94887; and
16 Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71475, subds. (u)(7) and (z) and
17 71710, subds. (a), (c), and (d))

18 40. Respondent's application is subject to denial because it has failed to demonstrate that
19 its educational programs have the capacity to meet minimum operating standards. (Educ. Code
20 §§ 94885, subd. (a)(1) and 94887; and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71475, subds. (u)(7) and (z)
21 and 71710, subds. (a), (c), and (d)). In particular:

22 a. Respondent did not submit current, updated syllabi for any of its degree-
23 granting educational programs. Pursuant to Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71475,
24 subdivision (u)(7), Respondent is required to provide these syllabi upon the Bureau's request. In
25 a letter dated December 6, 2016, the Bureau directed Respondent to submit syllabi for all of its
26 educational programs. Respondent did not respond. Accordingly, Respondent has not provided
27 evidence showing that the contents of its educational programs can achieve their stated
28 objectives. Respondent has also failed to demonstrate that its has created syllabi that comply with
Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71710, subdivision (c). As a result, Respondent has not

1 demonstrated that it has adequately planned an educational curriculum with the capacity to meet
2 minimum operating standards.

3 b. Respondent has not demonstrated that the general education requirements in its
4 undergraduate degree programs is comprised of a curriculum that includes those subject areas that
5 are necessary for a student to achieve its stated educational objectives.

6 c. Respondent has not demonstrated that any of its Bachelor's degree-level
7 educational program curricula require research of an appropriate degree that utilizes a library and
8 other learning resources, as required by Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71710, subdivision
9 (d).

10 d. Respondent has not demonstrated that it provides sufficient library and other
11 learning resources to meet and support the instruction needs of students that conduct academic
12 research at the Bachelor's level.

13 EIGHTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Faculty)

14 (Educ. Code § 94887 and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71720, subds. (a)(1) and (2))

15 41. Respondent's application is subject to denial because it has failed to demonstrate that
16 it employs duly qualified faculty or that it has written policies and procedures providing for the
17 participation of that faculty. (Educ. Code § 94887 and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71720, subds.
18 (a)(1) and (2)). In particular, in a letter dated December 6, 2016, the Bureau directed Respondent
19 to provide evidence that it has contracted with duly qualified faculty as well as its written policies
20 and procedures that provide for participation of the faculty. Respondent did not respond.

21 NINTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Facilities and Equipment)

22 (Educ. Code §§ 94885, subd. (a)(3) and 94887; and
23 Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71475, subd. (y) and 71735)

24 42. Respondent's application is subject to denial because Respondent has not provided
25 documentation that demonstrates that its facilities, instructional equipment, and materials are
26 sufficient to enable students to achieve the educational programs' goals. (Educ. Code §§ 94885,

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1 subd. (a)(3) and 94887; and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71475, subd. (y) and 71735). In
2 particular:

3 a. Respondent did not submit a diagram of its main campus location where
4 instruction will take place.

5 b. Respondent did not include specifications of significant equipment showing
6 that equipment complies with Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71735 and that the equipment
7 is sufficient to enable students to achieve the educational objectives of each education program.

8 c. Respondent failed to demonstrate that it maintains all valid permits from public
9 agencies related to the health and safety of Respondent's facilities and equipment.

10 TENTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Library and Other Learning Resources)

11 (Educ. Code § 94887 and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71475, subd. (z), and 71740)

12 43. Respondent's application is subject to denial because Respondent has not
13 demonstrated that it makes available for student use a library and other learning resources. (Educ.
14 Code § 94887 and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71475, subd. (z), and 71740). In particular:

15 a. Respondent represents in its 2015-2016 catalog that it depends on library and
16 other learning resources primarily from resources not in its possession. But Respondent has not
17 demonstrated that it can reasonably assure that students have access to the library collections and
18 resources of another institution, organization, or library.

19 b. Respondent has failed to identify a professional librarian or information
20 specialist, as required by Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71740, subdivision (d). Nor has
21 Respondent documented the qualifications of this individual with experience in electronic
22 retrieval of information, and has not provided documentation that this individual is able to support
23 faculty in curriculum matters and actively serve as a resource guide for students.

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2 ELEVENTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Catalog)

3 (Educ. Code § 94887; 94897, subd. (i)(1); 94900, subd. (b); 94900.5; and
4 94909, subds. (a)(1), (a)(5), (a)(8)(A), and (a)(9); and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5,
§§ 71475, subd. (bb); 71740, subds. (d)(2), (d)(3), and (d)(4); 71770, subd. (b); 71775.5, subds.
(a) and (c)(1); 71810, subds. (a), (b)(3), (b)(10) and (b)(15); and 71930, subds. (a) and (b))

5 44. Respondent's application is subject to denial because Respondent has failed to
6 demonstrate it is able to provide students with a catalog that meets minimum requirements.

7 (Educ. Code § 94887; 94897, subd. (i)(1); 94900, subd. (b); 94900.5; and 94909, subds. (a)(1),
8 (a)(5), (a)(8)(A), and (a)(9); and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71475, subd. (bb); 71740, subds.
9 (d)(2), (d)(3), and (d)(4); 71770, subd. (b); 71775.5, subds. (a) and (c)(1); 71810, subds. (a),
10 (b)(3), (b)(10) and (b)(15); and 71930, subds. (a) and (b).) In particular:

11 a. Respondent's catalog fails to include the Notice to Prospective Degree Program
12 Students disclosure. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71775.5, subds. (a) and (c)(1).)

13 b. Respondent's catalog lists an address not approved by the Bureau. (Educ. Code
14 § 94909, subd. (a)(1).)

15 c. Respondent's catalog fails to contain a description of its library or learning
16 resources and instructions on how to access those resources. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§
17 71475, subd. (bb); 71740, subds. (d)(2), (d)(3), and (d)(4); and 71810, subd. (b)(10).)

18 d. Respondent's catalog fails to contain course descriptions for two education
19 courses: "LA 205: Introduction to Ergonomic" and "LA 207: Topics in Contemporary Math."
20 (Educ. Code § 94909, subd. (a)(5).)

21 e. Respondent's catalog states a transfer credit policy that is ambiguous, and
22 Respondent declined the Bureau's request to clarify that policy. (Educ. Code § 94909, subd.
23 (a)(8)(A) and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71770, subd. (b).)

24 f. Respondent did not provide an updated schedule of total charges for a period of
25 attendance and an estimated schedule of total charges for the entire educational program, and
26 Respondent declined the Bureau's request to update related data. (Educ. Code § 94909, subd.
27 (a)(9).)

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1 g. Respondent's catalog does not contain a compliant student records retention
2 policy. (Educ. Code § 94900, subd. (b) and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71810, subd. (b)(15)
3 and 71930, subd. (b).)

4 h. Respondent's catalog states a document retention policy that contradicts itself
5 and, on its face, appears to violate the law. Specifically, Respondent's catalog alternatively states
6 that records will be maintained in California and in Hawaii. Respondent has failed to offer a
7 compliant or consistent document retention policy. (Educ. Code §§ 94897, subd. (i)(1) and
8 94900.5 and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71930, subd. (a).)

9 i. Respondent's catalog states an inconsistent and contradictory policy regarding
10 the admission of international students. (Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71810, subd. (b)(3).)

11 TWELFTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION
12 (Graduation and Completion-Related Documents)
13 (Educ. Code §§ 94885, subd. (a)(7), 94887, and 94932; and
14 Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §§ 71475, subd. (cc) and 71700)

15 45. Respondent's application is subject to denial because Respondent failed to submit a
16 copy of the document that is awarded to a graduating student upon successful completion of each
17 educational program. (Educ. Code §§ 94885, subd. (a)(7), 94887, and 94932; and Cal. Code of
18 Regs., title 5, § 71475, subd. (cc) and 71700.) While Respondent represented to the Bureau that
19 there were no substantive changes to report, pursuant to Education Code section 94932 and Code
20 of Regulations, title 5, sections 71700, Respondent is required to provide, at the Bureau's request,
21 documentation demonstrating its ability to obtain and maintain approval to operate. In a letter
22 dated December 6, 2016, the Bureau instructed Respondent to submit a copy of the document that
23 is provided to graduating students upon successful completion of each educational program.
24 Respondent did not respond.

25 THIRTEENTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION
26 (Custodian of Records)
27 (Educ. Code § 94887 and
28 Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 71475, subd. (dd)(2))

29 46. Respondent's application is subject to denial because Respondent's application does
30 not include the name, physical address, email address, and telephone number of the custodian of

1 records, and the physical addresses and telephone numbers of the offices or buildings where the
2 records will be maintained. (Educ. Code § 94887 and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, §71475, subd.
3 (dd)(2).)

4 FOURTEENTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

5 (Failure to Remit Dishonored Check Fee)
6 (Educ. Code §§ 94887 and 94930.5, subd. (c); and
7 Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 74000)

8 47. Respondent's application is subject to denial because Respondent has failed to remit
9 payment to the Bureau for a dishonored check and an associated delinquent penalty fee. (Educ.
10 Code §§ 94887 and 94930.5, subd. (c); and Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 74000.) In particular,
11 applicants seeking renewal of an approval to operate must pay to the Bureau a filing fee with their
12 application. Respondent's check for the filing fee was dishonored, and that resulted in a
13 delinquent penalty fee. Respondent has failed or refused to remit to the Bureau payment for
14 either.

15 FIFTEENTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

16 (Failure to Submit School Performance Fact Sheet)
17 (Educ. Code §§ 94887, 94902 and 94910; Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 74112)

18 48. Respondent's application is subject to denial because Respondent failed to provide
19 the Bureau with the School Performance Fact Sheets for 2013 and 2014. (Educ. Code §§ 94887,
20 94902 and 94910; Cal. Code of Regs., title 5, § 74112.)

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PRAYER

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters alleged in this Statement of Issues, and that following the hearing, the Director of the Department of Consumer Affairs issue a decision:

1. Denying Respondent's Application for Renewal of Approval to Operate a Non-Accredited Institution; and
2. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
