



School Performance Fact Sheet

The California Private Postsecondary Education Act (CPPEA) requires under section 94910 of the CPPES that a school provide information for each program in regards to, completion rates, placement rates, licensure exam passage rates, and salary/wage information. The following information is from data compiled for the period of January 1, 2011 to December 31, 2011. There is not a state licensure exam for Acupressure, Massage, and/or Bodywork; thus we do not report statistics for a passage rate.

Program Completion Rates*

In 2011, we had 85 new program enrollments, with a total of 136 students active in our programs. Of the 136 active students in 2012, 39 completed their programs in 2012 (28.67% completion rate). Details of each program below -

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***As to Program Completion Rates**

We believe it is in our students and all potential students best interests to know the following-

In California within the last 5 years there has been significant change in State requirements for BPPVE Approved Schools reporting their students progress, for Massage Therapists becoming “Certified” in California, and, of course in the local, statewide and national levels of the economy. In this ferment of activity and dramatic change, the Acupressure Institute is working diligently to provide students with school performance statistics so that they may make well-informed choices as to their education. *In any statistical representation the questions asked, and the context of the questions asked strongly influence the statistics generated.*

The primary mission of the Acupressure Institute is to train people in the Arts & Crafts of Acupressure and Asian Bodywork Therapy. For some, Acupressure training is vocational and for some Acupressure training is avocational. As a BPPVE approved school, and especially as a candidate for re-approval/approval via the BPPE we are regulated as if we were 100% a vocational school, and we provide statistics pursuant to that regulation. This makes our completion rates lower than they would be if we only measured vocationally oriented students.

To provide a sense of the populations we teach, both vocational and avocational, we look at three groups we name Self Care, Share Care and Professional Care. Approx. 33% of our students study Acupressure solely for Self Care and/or self-improvement. Approx. 33% of our students are studying Acupressure as Professional Care, that is, with the intention of generating some income from the practice and/or teaching of Acupressure. The other 33% look to their training at AI to help them Share Care as an avocation, with family, friends, pets, and as volunteers in various roles in the community.

In addition to the differences noted above, for those seeking California State Approved Certification as a Certified Massage Practitioner (CPM) and/or as a Certified Massage Therapist (CMT), CERTIFICATION itself is presently VOLUNTARY. Thus, not all inclined towards professional practice or who are practicing professionally are actually “Certified”. Application for professional status in California DOES NOT require completion of a program, only that appropriate hours get transcribed by an Approved School. Both the voluntary nature of Certification in California, and the non-requirement of program completion work against schools such as ours having maximal levels of program completion as defined by present regulations.

AI’s training programs have always been designed as flexible programs where a student can largely set their own educational pace. Only 1 AI Program **must** be completed in 1 year (70 hr. ACE Program), whereas all other programs may take 20 months to 4 years for completion, thus tracking 1-year completion rates has inherent issues as far as providing a clear picture of “completion”.

This fact sheet is filed with the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education. Regardless of any information you may have relating to completion rates, placement rates, starting salaries, or license exam passage rates, this fact sheet contains the information as calculated pursuant to state law.
