19	<u>PARTIES</u>
20	1. Joanne Wenzel (Complainant) brings this Statement of Issues solely in her official
21	capacity as the Chief of the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education, Department of
22	Consumer Affairs.
23	2. On or about January 11, 2012, the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education
24	received an application for an Approval to Operate an Institution Non-Accredited from Sunrise
25	College of Massage and Bodyworks; Chang B. Shin (Respondent). On or about January 4, 2012,
26	Chun Ha Kim certified under penalty of perjury to the truthfulness of all statements, answers, and
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27	representations in the application. The Bureau denied the application on July 14, 2014.
	representations in the application. The Bureau denied the application on July 14, 2014.
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JURISDICTION

- 3. Education Code section 94891 states:
- "(a) The bureau shall adopt by regulation the process and procedures whereby an institution may obtain a renewal of an approval to operate.
- (b) To be granted a renewal of an approval to operate, the institution shall demonstrate its continued capacity to meet the minimum operating standards.

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STATUTORY PROVISIONS

- 4. Business and Professions Code section 477 as used in this division provides in pertinent part:
 - (a) "Board" includes "bureau"
- (b) "License" includes certificate, registration or other means to engage in a business or profession regulated by this code.
 - 5. Education Code section 94885 states:
- "(a) The bureau shall adopt by regulation minimum operating standards for an institution that shall reasonably ensure that all of the following occur:
 - (1) The content of each educational program can achieve its stated objective.
- (2) The institution maintains specific written standards for student admissions for each educational program and those standards are related to the particular educational program.
- (3) The facilities, instructional equipment, and materials are sufficient to enable students to achieve the educational program's goals.
 - (4) The institution maintains a withdrawal policy and provides refunds.
 - (5) The directors, administrators, and faculty are properly qualified.
- (6) The institution is financially sound and capable of fulfilling its commitments to students.
 - (7) That, upon satisfactory completion of an educational program, the institution gives

students a document signifying the degree or diploma awarded.

- (8) Adequate records and standard transcripts are maintained and are available to students.
- (9) The institution is maintained and operated in compliance with this chapter and all other applicable ordinances and laws.

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6. Education Code section 94886 states:

"Except as exempted in Article 4 (commencing with Section 94874) or in compliance with the transition provisions in Article 2 (commencing with Section 94802), a person shall not open, conduct, or do business as a private postsecondary educational institution in this state without obtaining an approval to operate under this chapter."

7. Education Code section 94887:

"An approval to operate shall be granted only after an applicant has presented sufficient evidence to the bureau, and the bureau has independently verified the information provided by the applicant through site visits or other methods deemed appropriate by the bureau, that the applicant has the capacity to satisfy the minimum operating standards. The bureau shall deny an application for an approval to operate if the application does not satisfy those standards."

- 8. Education Code section 94909 states:
- "(a) Except as provided in subdivision (d), prior to enrollment, an institution shall provide a prospective student, either in writing or electronically, with a school catalog containing, at a minimum, all of the following:
 - (8) A detailed description of institutional policies in the following areas:
- (A) Admissions policies, including the institution's policies regarding the acceptance of credits earned at other institutions or through challenge examinations and achievement tests, admissions requirements for ability-to-benefit students, and a list describing any transfer or articulation agreements between the institution and any other college or university that provides for the transfer of credits earned in the program of instruction. If the institution has not entered

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into an articulation or transfer agreement with any other college or university, the institution shall disclose that fact.

REGULATORY PROVISIONS

- 9. California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 70000, subdivision (r), states:
- "(r) "Objectives" are the goals and methods by which the institution fulfills its mission and transforms it into measureable student learning outcomes for each educational program."
 - 10. California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71100 states:
- "(a) An applicant seeking approval to operate pursuant to Section 94886 of the Code, other than Approval to Operate by Accreditation pursuant to Section 94890(a)(1) of the Code, shall complete the "Application for Approval to Operate for an Institution Not Accredited," Form Application 94886 (rev. 2/10). An applicant seeking approval to operate by accreditation pursuant to Section 94890(a)(1) of the Code shall comply with section 71390."
- (b) An applicant shall submit the completed form, the information or documentation, required by this Article, the appropriate application fee as provided in Section 94930.5(a)(1) of the Code, and any appropriate annual fee as required by Article 1 of Chapter 5 of this Division, to the Bureau.
- (c) An application that fails to contain all of the information required by this article shall render it incomplete."
 - 11. California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71170 states: "The institution shall describe in detail its mission and objectives."
 - 12. California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71700 states:
- "The Bureau may request that an institution document compliance with the standards set forth in the Act and this Division to obtain and maintain an approval to operate."
 - 13. California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71705 states:
- "An institution shall have a written statement of its mission and the objectives for each educational program. The mission and the objectives shall indicate the kind of education offered,

- (1) An institution shall employ instructors who possess the academic, experiential and professional qualifications to teach, including a minimum of three years of experience, education and training in current practices of the subject area they are teaching. If an instructor does not possess the required three years of experience, education, and training in the subject area they are teaching, the institution shall document the qualifications the instructor possesses that are equivalent to the minimum qualifications.
- (2) Each instructor shall maintain their knowledge by completing continuing education courses in his or her subject area, classroom management or other courses related to teaching.
 - 16. California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71735 states:
- "(a) An institution shall have sufficient facilities and necessary equipment to support the achievement of the educational objectives of all of the courses and educational programs in which students are enrolled. If an institution represents that the educational service will fit or prepare a student for employment in a particular occupation or as described in particular job titles, either of the following conditions shall be met:
- (1) The equipment used for instruction or provided to the student shall be comparable in model type or features to equipment generally used in those occupations or job titles at the time the instruction is offered.
- (2) The institution shall establish that the equipment used for instruction or provided to a student is not obsolete and is sufficient for instructional purposes to reasonably assure that a student acquires the necessary level of education, training, skill and experience to obtain employment in the field of training and to perform the tasks associated with the occupation or job title to which the educational program was represented to lead.
- 17. California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71770, subdivision (b), provides in pertinent part:

"The institution shall specify the maximum credit it will transfer from another institution for each educational program, and the basis upon which the transferred credit will be awarded.

2	CAUSES FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION
3	(Incomplete Application)
4	20. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Business and Professions Code
15	sections 480, subdivision (a)(3)(A), Education Code sections 94885, 94886 and 94887 and
16	California Code of Regulations, title 5, division 7.5, section 71100, subdivisions (a) – (c), in that
17	on or about January 2012, Respondent submitted an incomplete application to the Bureau. Each
18	violation is a sole and separate cause for denial. The violations are as follows:
19	a. <u>Incomplete Application.</u>
20	1. Respondent failed to provide evidence that it has the capacity to meet the
21	minimum operating standards under Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations (CCR), sections
22	71170, 70000, subdivision (r), and 71705 in that it failed to provide statement of mission and
23	objectives underlying the institution's educational programs. The mission statement submitted
24	for the Bureau application on May 5, 2014, claims that the institution seek to prepare
25	"chiropractors" among other professionals. The institution did not propose to offer a chiropractor
26	educational program. Further, the institution's educational objectives are not the goals and
27	methods by which the institution fulfills its mission and transforms it into measurable learning
28	outcomes. For instance, the institution's first objective is "to graduate at least 90% of students

with a passing grade." The objective does not describe how the institution is going to fulfill the mission of preparing "exceptional healthcare professionals."

2. Respondent failed to provide evidence that it has the capacity to meet the minimum operating standards under CCR, sections 71170, 70000, subdivision (r), and 71705 in that it failed to submit a consistent statement of mission and objectives. The revised statement of mission and objectives received on May 5, 2014 is different than the one in the catalog. The Bureau is unable to determine the institutions statement of mission and objectives.

b. Exemplars of Student Agreements.

1. Respondent failed to provide evidence that it has the capacity to meet the minimum operating standards under CCR, section 71800 subdivision (e)(11) in that the institution itemization of Enrollment Agreement charges does not indicate the Student Tuition Recovery Fund fee as "non-refundable."

c. Instruction and Degrees Offered.

1. Respondent failed to provide evidence that it has the capacity to meet the minimum operating standards under CCR, section 71710 subdivision (c)(4) and (f) in that the Bureau was unable to determine whether the course syllabi submitted meets the minimum requirements of the educational programs. After requesting fourteen (14) specific course syllabi, the institution submitted four (4) consolidated syllabi which may cover all the required topics. The four (4) course syllabi submitted followed the same structure, but failed to include the following: 1) designed or organized by duly qualified faculty, 2) sequence and frequency of lessons or class sessions; and 3) evaluation by duly qualified faculty of the expected learning outcomes.

2. Respondent failed to provide evidence that it has the capacity to meet the minimum operating standards under CCR, section 71710 in that the institution failed to develop and provide course syllabi for the Advance Massage Therapy (1000 hour) educational program. Three (3) of the consolidated course syllabi (Anatomy/Physiology/Kinesiology, Pathology and Theory & Practice of Massage) did not provide list of topics necessary for the advanced level.

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1. Respondent failed to provide evidence that it has the capacity to meet the minimum operating standards under CCR section 71720 subdivision (b)(1), in that the Bureau was unable to determine if three of the four faculty that may be actually employed by the institution meet the minimum qualification as "duly qualified faculty." The institution submitted resumes for C.S.P., S.W.J., and J.Y., to teach the massage therapy programs. The institution failed to provide evidence that these faculty members possess the academic, experiential and professional qualifications to teach massage therapy, including a minimum of three years of experience, education and training in current practices of the subject area they are assigned to teach.

2. Respondent failed to provide evidence that it has the capacity to meet the minimum operating standards under CCR section 71720 subdivision (b)(2), in that the Bureau was unable to determine if three of the four faculty that may be actually employed by the institution are maintaining their knowledge by completing continuing education courses in his or her subject area, classroom management or other courses related to teaching. The institution submitted resumes for the C.S.P., S.W.J., and J.Y., to teach the massage therapy programs. The institution failed to provide evidence that these faculty members are actively taking courses related to massage therapy.

Catalog.

1. Respondent failed to provide evidence that it has the capacity to meet the minimum operating standards under CCR sections 70000, subdivision (r), 71170, 71705 and 71810, subdivision (b) (2), in that the institution catalog failed to provide a sufficient statement of mission and objectives for each of the institutions educational programs. The submitted statement of mission for all programs is exactly the same except the number of hours for each of the programs. The submitted objectives are merely sets of untested percentages of graduation. The educational objectives should be the goals and methods by which the institution fulfills its mission and transforms it into measurable learning outcomes.

- 2. Respondent failed to provide evidence that it has the capacity to meet the minimum operating standards under CCR section 71810, subdivision (b) (10), in that the institution failed to describe the location of the library and whether student could utilize the library as a study area or conduct internet research.
- 3. Respondent failed to provide evidence that it has the capacity to meet the minimum operating standards under CCR section 71770, subdivision (b) and Education Code section 94909, subdivision (a)(8)(A) in that the institution failed to clearly explain the admission policy accepting students with a "college transcript." The institution failed to indicate how many college units are required of students upon admission.

f. Facility.

1. Respondent failed to provide evidence that it has the capacity to meet the minimum operating standards under CCR section 71735, subdivision (a) in that he Bureau was unable to determine whether the institution has sufficient facilities for the four (4) massage therapy programs and fourteen (14) continuing education courses. The institution failed to explain where and when each class will be held and failed to provide a building diagram showing the massage therapy rooms, library, etc.

PRAYER

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged, and that following the hearing, the Director of the Department of Consumer Affairs issue a decision:

- Denying the application of Sunrise College of Massage and Bodyworks; Chang B.
 Shin, owner, for an Approval to Operate an Institution Non-Accredited;
 - 2. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
