(OLIVET UNIVERSITY) ACCUSATION

PARTIES

- 1. Deborah Cochrane (Complainant) brings this Accusation solely in her official capacity as the Chief of the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education (Bureau), Department of Consumer Affairs.
- 2. On or about December 13, 2004, the Bureau issued a Temporary Approval to Operate Institution Code Number 88680286. On November 9, 2006, the Bureau issued Approval to Operate Institution Code Number 88680286 to Olivet University, owned by Olivet University, Board of Directors (Respondent). The Approval to Operate expired on November 1, 2014 and has not been renewed. On or about December 1, 2011, the Bureau granted Approval to Operate by means of accreditation to Respondent. The Accredited Approval to Operate was in full force and effect at all relevant times herein and will expire February 29, 2024 unless renewed.
- 3. Respondent is approved to operate programs in Chinese, English, Korean, and Spanish for the conferral of Bachelor, Master, and Doctorate programs.

JURISDICTION

- 4. This Accusation is brought before the Director of the Department of Consumer Affairs (Director) for the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education, under the authority of the following laws. All section references are to the Education Code (Code) unless otherwise indicated.
- 5. Business and Professions Code, section 118, subdivision (b), provides that the suspension, expiration, surrender or cancellation of a license shall not deprive the Bureau of jurisdiction to proceed with a disciplinary action during the period within which the license may be renewed, restored, reissued or reinstated.
- 6. Section 94875 provides that the Bureau shall regulate private postsecondary educational institutions.
 - 7. Section 94877 provides, in relevant part, that:
 - (a) The bureau shall adopt and shall enforce regulations to implement this chapter pursuant to the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code).

- (c)(1) A Doctor of Philosophy degree (Ph.D.) is a research-oriented degree requiring a minimum of three years of full-time graduate education or the equivalent in part-time study. Such a doctoral program shall include substantial instruction in both theory and research at an advanced level in a designated field and specialty, and may only be awarded to a student who has completed a program of study that includes research methodology and demonstrated learning achievement through original research directly attributable to the student. Each educational program leading to a Doctor of Philosophy degree shall involve preparation for scholarship and systematic inquiry.
- (2)(A) Each Doctor of Philosophy program shall include a minimum of two formal evaluations of the student by a doctoral committee. The doctoral committee shall be composed of at least three members of the institution's own faculty who meet the qualifications in subdivision (c)(3).
- (B) The first evaluation shall consider the student's qualifications, including the student's knowledge, skills, and conceptual framework, for undertaking rigorous inquiry into the student's designated field.
- (C) The second evaluation shall consider the design procedures and products of a formal original inquiry proposed and completed by the student.
- (3) The faculty members who serve on each student's doctoral examining committee shall meet the following qualifications:
- (A) Each member shall have earned a Doctoral degree from: an institution that is approved by the Bureau or previously approved by a predecessor agency of the Bureau; or an accredited institution in the United States or Canada; or other state approved institution that documents that the institution at which the faculty member earned his or her degree is equivalent to an institution that is approved by the Bureau; or an institution outside the United States or Canada and in addition provides a comprehensive evaluation of the degree performed by a foreign credential evaluation service that is a member of the National Association of Credential Evaluation Services (NACES).
- (B) The chair and the majority of the committee shall have earned degrees related to the student's field of investigation.

onsite visit at the San Francisco Campus location, and Special Investigator AP conducted an onsite visit at the Branch location in Los Angeles, California.

Anza Visit Conducted November 15, 2022

- 29. Upon arrival, Bureau staff could not enter the campus location as the campus was secured by a security gate. Bureau staff attempted to contact the number for the campus via the security guard office. The call was not answered. RD called four telephone numbers provided by Respondent to the Bureau. RD was ultimately able to contact an answering service. The answering service transferred the call to Respondent's direct contact telephone number. Respondent did not answer the telephone call. Bureau staff were able to gain access to the campus by following a car who accessed the gate. No staff was present in the Administration office. Bureau staff were eventually met by University President MG. JM requested copies of current student files but MG indicated the files were contained in a "File Dump" and requested extra time to restore and organize student files. MG provided the student files on November 15, 2022. JM requested a copy of the syllabus for "Bible 520" but did not receive it during the course and review of the Anza campus visit.
- 30. As part of the visit, RD and AC observed the Microeconomics class instruction identified as "ECON 310" in the course catalogue and the Microeconomic Analysis class identified as "ECON 610" in the course catalogue. Students were present in the classroom but the instructor conducted the course from a live stream platform.

Mill Valley Visit Conducted January 31, 2023

31. On January 31, 2023, RB, DS, JM, and FR conducted an unannounced site visit. They met with Institution Professor KT, Campus Director/Professor of Theology, Dr. JL, and Director, Doctor of Ministry Program, Dr. TC. JM requested copies of the Faculty List, Campus Map, Course Offerings Winter 2023, Current Mill Valley Enrolled Student List, Course Offerings January 31, 2023, and the Faculty Handbook. After reviewing the Course Offerings Winter 2023, JM and FR elected to observe the "Old Testament 1" and "Statistical Computing with R" courses. RD requested Dr. JL provide the 2020 and 2021 SPFS Backup Data. Dr. JL consulted with administrative staff and advised the information was stored at the Anza location. Dr. JL

contacted MG by telephone and informed RD that MG would forward the information by February 3, 2023.

32. On February 8, 2023, RD again requested Respondent's back-up data for its 2020 and 2021 Student Performance Fact Sheets (SPFS) by email. Respondent did not provide the data until February 9, 2023.

Deficiencies Identified in Documents Produced by Respondent

- 33. The Bureau received Respondent's Annual Report for the 2020-2021 school year. The Annual Report also included SPFS and Graduate Data. Bureau Lead Annual Report Analyst JJ reviewed the document and determined that the data reported was inconsistent with graduate data and employment data reported in the SPFS. The Graduate Identification data failed to report the Occupation Description for each graduate.
- 34. The Financial Statement for the 2020-2021 school year also revealed that Respondent had not maintained a ratio of current assets to current liabilities of 1.25 to 1.00, or greater, by the end of the 2021 fiscal year. Respondent's ratio of current assets to current liabilities was 1.16 to 1.00.
- 35. A review of the SPFS Backup data for the 2020-2021 school year found the following missing information and violations:

36. DS and JM reviewed the following documents obtained during the November 15, 2022 onsite visit of the Anza and San Francisco campus: Olivet Undergraduate Academic Catalog (2022-23), Olivet Graduate Academic Catalog (2022-23), Olivet Zinzendorf School of Doctoral Studies Academic Catalog (2022-23), current student enrolled rosters (campus-based students), sample active students files, Fall 2022 Anza Campus Class schedule, syllabi, Mill Valley Campus Map, Bachelor's in Information Technology and Master's in Information Technology program outlines, current quarter course schedule, Undergraduate catalog excerpts, class schedule for the Week of October 14-19, 2022, class schedule for the week of November 14-19, 2022, revised schedule for the week of November 14-19, Tuesday class schedule, Tuesday class roster, faculty course assignment schedule, Faculty list with contact information, September 1 through November 15, 2022 Calendar Schedule, and Student Rosters 2021-2022.

37. DS and JM reviewed the following documents obtained during the January 31, 2022 San Francisco campus onsite visit: Faculty list, Campus map, Course Offerings Winter 2023,

current Mill Valley enrolled student list, course offerings January 31, 2023, and Faculty Handbook.

- 38. DS determined the following institutional operating standards violations:
- a.) A review of faculty member files indicate that Respondent did not have NACES evaluations for foreign degrees obtained by faculty members for three faculty members.
- b.) Approximately twelve faculty members obtained their degree or terminal degree from Respondent with a majority having a degree in the Doctor of Ministry.
- c.) Faculty records provided contained expired contracts or did not document which course(s) the faculty member was to instruct.
- d.) The institution does not have sufficient faculty members to support the number of programs offered by the institution.
- e.) Respondent does not have sufficient faculty members contracted to offer the general education courses to satisfy the requirement for the awarding of an undergraduate degree program. The Faculty Handbook states, "Each fulltime and part-time faculty member teaching credit courses leading toward the baccalaureate degree must have completed at least 18 graduate hours in the teaching discipline." The provided faculty transcripts do not demonstrate compliance with this requirement. Respondent also fails to demonstrate it has sufficient faculty members to offer graduate degrees. The Faculty Handbook states, "Each full-time and part-time teaching courses at the graduate degree-level must hold a terminal degree, usually the earned doctorate, in the teaching discipline or related discipline." The provided faculty transcripts do not demonstrate compliance with this requirement.
- f.) Respondent provided a list of faculty, however the list did not match the faculty identified in the Institution's catalog.
 - 39. DS determined the following administrative violations:
- a.) During the unannounced onsite visits, Respondent did not have adequate staff to produce documents requested in a timely fashion.
- b.) Respondent's staffing is inconsistent at both campus locations when compared to positions identified in the organizational chart.

- c.) Respondent failed to provide documentation of student withdrawal requests or proof of a refund of tuition and fees for students listed on the withdrawn student list.
- 40. DS determined that Respondent failed to meet self-monitoring procedures in that a review of faculty personnel files indicated that approximately sixteen of the faculty members' personnel records had expired contracts, approximately four faculty members did not have contract dates, approximately thirteen faculty members did not have faculty course assignments as a part of their contract, and faculty files did not contain the faculty member's academic transcripts.
 - 41. DS determined the following record violations:
 - a.) Bureau staff were not given access to all of the requested records in a timely fashion.
- b.) The institution offers its educational program through three different methods of delivery: direct instruction, distance education, and "hybrid." The curriculum did not clearly and consistently differentiate the method of delivery in the syllabi.
 - c.) Respondent's faculty member list did not match that in the catalog.
 - d.) Student files did not include Enrollment Agreements.
 - 42. JM determined the following minimum operating violations:
- a.) Respondent did not offer adequate courses to support the students who have enrolled in Chinese or Korean language programs on site.
- b.) Respondent did not offer adequate courses to support the enrolled student population on site. Specifically, the following programs are found to be offering no more than a single 4-unit class on campus in the Winter 2023 quarter: Information Technology and Music for the Bachelor of Arts programs and Music, Graphic Arts and Information Technology in the Master of Arts program.
- c.) The schedule of classes provided by the institution for the Anza and San Francisco campus Fall 2022 quarter included inappropriately merged classes. Courses for students enrolled in Bachelor of Arts programs were combined with Master of Arts programs. Courses using introductory text books were combined with intermediate level courses suppressing the

level of merged courses in a way that will impair student learning of the appropriate subject matter.

- d.) During the Anza onsite visit, JM observed that two of the three class sessions consisted of livestreamed professors accessing the Zoom platform from another location to students in a classroom unattended by faculty. Respondent's catalogs describe "hybrid" classes as "sure to have a regular onsite component where attendance is tracked and face-to-face instruction/discussion is provided." With the faculty of record livestreaming from a remote location, no duly qualified faculty are providing the necessary "face-to-face instruction/discussion."
- e.) During the Mill Valley visit, Campus Director Dr. JL informed JM that teaching or faculty assistants are at times stationed in the classrooms *in lieu* of duly qualified faculty.
- f.) The syllabi did not accurately present the curriculum in a logical or organized manner and had ambiguities regarding the assessment of learning outcomes by duly qualified faculty. Syllabi were not provided as requested for some courses.
- g.) The term "scholarship" referenced in Respondent's catalogs is not clearly defined and the requirements for scholarships are not set forth in the catalog or Respondent's policies and procedures.

FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Insufficient Course Offerings)

43.
