27	application. The Bureau denied the application on September 28, 2017.	
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- REGULATORY PROVISIONS Title 5, California Code of Regulations (CCR), section 71100 states: 8. 2 3 (a) An applicant seeking approval to operate pursuant to Section 94886 of the Code, other than Approval to Operate by Accreditation pursuant to Section 4 94890(a)(1) of the Code, shall complete the "Application for Approval to Operate for an Institution Not Accredited," Form Application 94886 (rev. 2/10). An 5 applicant seeking approval to operate by accreditation pursuant to Section 94890(a)(1) of the Code shall comply with section 71390. 6 (b) An applicant shall submit the completed form, the information or 7 documentation required by this Article, the appropriate application fee as provided in Section 94930.5(a)(1) of the Code, and any appropriate annual fee as 8 required by Article 1 of Chapter 5 of this Division, to the Bureau. 9 (c) An application that fails to contain all of the information required by this article shall render it incomplete. 10 9. Title 5, CCR, section 71700 states: 11 12 The Bureau may request that an institution document compliance with the standards set forth in the Act and this Division to obtain and maintain an approval 13 to operate. 10. Title 5, CCR section 71710 states in part: 14 15 In order to meet its mission and objectives, the educational program defined in section 94837 of the Code shall be comprised of a curriculum that includes: 16 (a) those subject areas that are necessary for a student to achieve the educational 17 objectives of the educational program in which the student is enrolled; 18 (b) subject areas and courses or modules that are presented in a logically organized manner or sequence to students; 19 (c) course or module materials that are designed or organized by duly qualified 20 faculty. For each course or module, each student shall be provided with a syllabus or course outline that contains: 21 22 (2) a statement of educational objectives: 23 (3) length of the educational program: 24 25 (5) complete citations of textbooks and other required written materials; 26
  - (6) sequential and detailed outline of subject matter to be addressed or a list of skills to be learned and how those skills are to be measured;

board members and clarification regarding its certificate program. On September 30, 2016, the		
Bureau sent Respondent a letter advising that the Bureau could not grant Respondent an approval		
to operate because of deficiencies in the Application, including deficiencies pertaining to the		
institution's owner, governing board, enrollment agreement, instruction and degrees offered, the		
description of the educational programs and the school catalog, among other things.		
15 On or about January A and 23, 2017, the Bureau received Respondent's response to		

- 15. On or about January 4 and 23, 2017, the Bureau received Respondent's response to the deficiency letter. On July 10, 2017, the Bureau sent Respondent another deficiency letter identifying deficiencies pertaining to the owner's information, organization and management, governing board, Enrollment Agreement, instruction and degrees offered, the description of the educational programs and the school catalog, among other things. The Bureau requested additional information be submitted by August 15, 2017.
- 16. On August 15, 2017, the Bureau received Respondent's response to the second deficiency letter. The Bureau denied Respondent's Application for Approval to Operate a Non-Accredited Institution and sent Respondent a "Notice of Denial" on September 28, 2017.
- 17. On or about February 15, 2019 and February 22, 2019, Respondent submitted additional documents in support of its application for an approval to operate. The additional documents submitted corrected some deficiencies but an additional deficiency was discovered in the newly submitted documents.
- 18. On or about March 14, 2019, Respondent submitted additional documents in support of its application for an approval to operate. The additional documents submitted corrected some deficiencies but new deficiencies were discovered in the newly submitted documents.

### FIRST CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Failure to Demonstrate Capacity to Satisfy Minimum Operating Standards
- Student Assessment Prior to Admission)

19. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Code section 94887 and title 5, CCR, sections 71100, 71700, 71710 and 71715, for failing to demonstrate its capacity to satisfy minimum operating standards as follows:

# THIRD CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Failure to Demonstrate Capacity to Satisfy Minimum Operating Standards

- Description of Educational Programs)
- 21. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Code section 94887 and title 5, CCR, sections 71100, 71700 and 71710, for failing to demonstrate its capacity to satisfy minimum operating standards as follows:
- a. Respondent failed to demonstrate that subject areas and courses or modules in its educational programs are presented in a logically organized manner or sequence to students, in violation of title 5, CCR, 71710(b), as follows:
- i. The Academic Policies in Respondent's catalog required each student to log into a course module during the first week of instruction. However, the syllabus for the "Introduction to Computers" course did not include an educational component addressing how to log on the course nor provide an orientation to the on-line learning management system.

  Respondent subsequently provided a 2019 Catalog that includes an orientation for the online learning management system, known as Canvas Online Classroom. However, Respondent provided no information as to whether this course is a prerequisite for its other courses for which it seeks approval, or whether the Respondent wishes to add this course to its list of approved programs.
- b. Respondent failed to demonstrate that the subject areas in the "Seeking New Employment" course are sufficient for the student to achieve the educational objectives of the course as required by 5 CCR §71710(c)(2), as follows:
- i. In or about March, 2019, Respondent changed the name of the "Coping with New Employment" course to "Seeking New Employment" because of deficiencies in the course content. However, because the syllabus for the "Seeking New Employment" course does not include a statement of educational objectives as required by 5 CCR §71710(c)(2), Respondent failed to demonstrate that the subject areas in the new course are sufficient for the student to meet the educational objectives.

c. Respondent failed to demonstrate that the courses "Seeking New Employment," "Computer Literacy," "Beginning Word 2016," "Beginning Excel 2016," and "Beginning PowerPoint 2016" meet the program's educational objectives in that the revised syllabi for these courses do not include a statement of the educational objectives, length of the educational program, a complete citation of textbooks and other required written materials and how each skill will be measured, as required by title 5, CCR, 71710(c).

## FOURTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Failure to Demonstrate Capacity to Satisfy Minimum Operating Standards

- Subject Areas Necessary to Achieve Educational Objective of Program)
- 22. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Code sections 94887, and title 5, CCR, sections 71100, 71700 and 71710(a), for failing to demonstrate its capacity to satisfy minimum operating standards in that the syllabi for the courses "Seeking New Employment," "Computer Literacy," "Beginning Word 2016," "Beginning Excel 2016," and "Beginning PowerPoint 2016" do not match the course descriptions in the 2019 School Catalog.

# FIFTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Failure to Demonstrate Capacity to Satisfy Minimum Operating Standards

- Evaluation by Duly Qualified Faculty of Learning Outcomes)
- 23. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Code sections 94887, and title 5, CCR, sections 71100, 71700 and 71710(e) and (f) for failing to demonstrate that its course syllabic contain specific learning outcomes to measure the students' learning of the material and that duly qualified faculty evaluate those learning outcomes in that:
- a. Respondent failed to demonstrate whether assignments are to be submitted to faculty for assessment, and how and when a student is expected to submit assignments in the syllabi or in the Canvas Learning Management System.
- b. For competency-based courses such as "Beginning Word 2016," "Beginning Excel 2016," and "Beginning PowerPoint 2016," which do not use quiz-based assessments, Respondent failed to demonstrate how specific learning outcomes are measured by duly qualified faculty to determine if students are learning the material.

c. The course description for "Seeking New Employment" states that competencies are measured by both practical and written testing, however Respondent failed to demonstrate how practical assessments are performed by duly qualified faculty.

#### SIXTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Prohibited Practices – Guarantee or Overstatement of Job Availability)

24. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Code section 94897(b) in that Respondent's course descriptions in the 2019 Catalog for the Beginning Microsoft Word, Beginning Microsoft Excel, and Beginning Microsoft PowerPoint courses overstate job availability in that Respondent's course description for each of these courses state:

Students successfully completing this course will receive a certificate of completion and be qualified to obtain entry-level employment in the field of Office/Business Administration with some of the following career opportunities: Administrative Assistant, General Office Clerk, Secretary, Receptionist and Information Clerk.

# SEVENTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Failure to Demonstrate Capacity to Satisfy Minimum Operating Standards

- Delivery Through Distance Education)
- 25. Respondent's application is subject to denial under title 5, CCR, sections 71100, 71700 and 71715(d)(1) in that Respondent failed to demonstrate that the Computer Literacy course is appropriate for delivery through distance education as follows:
- a. The Computer Literacy Course includes competencies such as "start and log onto a computer" and "how to use a mouse and keyboard." Respondent failed to demonstrate that distance education is an appropriate platform for a student who does not know how to use a computer.

### PRAYER

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged, and that following the hearing, the Director of the Department of Consumer Affair's issue a decision:

1. Denying the application of Online Vocational Academy, Inc. for a Approval to Operate an Institution Non-Accredited; and,
